

YES Angie's list is a scam and allow me to explain why it's a scam.

I'm speaking from the position of a service provider that has advertised with Angie's List and not a consumer who is looking for services.

Angie's List want's your money and providing you with quality referrals are last on their list. Angie's List is a "Zero accountability" company in that everything is the customers fault and they are responsible for nothing when in fact they are responsible for everything.

In August of 2019 I entered a contract with Angie's list to advertise for my business. It was the minimum of \$300.00 per month for 1 year and a total of \$3,600.00. They rushed me through the process not giving me adequate time to get my reviews posted. Then some of my customer posted reviews for me online but some flaw in Angie's list system prevented those reviews from being posted to my profile. Ok that's no big deal right? As long as calls are coming in I will manage this situation.

So I made the \$300.00 payments for August and September and over the course of those 2 months I received a total of 8 forms of contact. Not exactly good when you compared the amount of money I was paying. To make matters worse 5 of those 8 forms of contact were WRONG NUMBERS!!! Yes you read that correctly. I was receiving calls for other businesses on my phone number that I have had for 20 years. I contacted my representative and it was at that point I learned that the number displayed on my ad was not my phone number but rather a number created by Angie's list that was part of a "relay service". Angie's list uses a relay service to control the calls that come in for service providers. This was never disclosed to me when they were trying to sign me up for services. If they had ever said "Oh by the way....your phone number won't be displayed on the ad and instead we post some bogus number that's part of a relay system so we can fully control how many calls you get" I would have never entered into any agreement with Angie's list had I known of this.

As we entered October of 2019 I was not getting any calls at all and of the 2 legitimate calls I received (2 calls, 1 email) I closed on one deal that yielded a meager \$300.00. In the 2nd week of October 2019 I received yet another wrong number coming from Angie's list (This was the last of the 8 contacts) and I abruptly cancelled the contract. I spoke to my representative and






plame on me and that somenow MY NOMBER was associated with some other service!!! They also informed me that I would still be responsible for 35% of the remaining contract since I was cancelling early.

Upon entering November 2019 I was able to close on the 2nd contact received in late September. That job yielded \$3,000.00. At this time Angie's list is threatening to send me to collections for the sum of \$1,200.00 for the 35% of the remaining contract following my cancellation. They take no accountability for hiding valuable information involving my ad (I.E. My phone number not being displayed) and refuse to admit that they breached this contract when I was receiving wrong numbers from consumers seeking service providers. This raises the question of "If I'm receiving wrong numbers from people looking for other service providers then how many people called on my ad and were also relayed to wrong service providers??". It's a fair and legitimate question.

Angie's list is now taking the position of "Big business" and trying to bully the little guy (Me) and care nothing about the horrible service received or the very obvious fact that they breached the agreement and hid very important information from me that would have prevented me from doing business with them in the first place.

DO NOT do business with these people!! Do business with people that are accountable and not just trying to steal your money and giving horrible service in return.



PROS: Firstly, I would like to say that the person who provided cleaning services for me was wonderful! He was professional, kind, on time, and efficient.

CONS: Miscommunication in scheduling. I called in and booked with an "Angi's list" customer service attendent,we discussed 2 people coming over to clean for 2 hrs. I also spoke with a second attendant who confirmed. I got a text to get the app for more details, and the info was incorrect: 1 person for 3 hrs. When the individual came over, he stayed for 4 hrs.



As a business owner that has a business account, with a monthly fee, I'm disappointed in Yelp for a few reasons.

First, let me say that allowing customers to review a business is a good thing. Yelp is one such site that really helps quality businesses rise above inferior competitive businesses. Many of my competitors have 2-3.5 stars while my businesses are 4.5-5 stars with 5-7x as many reviews.

Yelp can be a great service to both customer and business.

What I don't like is when people use Yelp and other sites to terrorize businesses by slandering them in reviews.

I can't begin to tell you how many times a person comes into one of my retail businesses and immediately, after being told we can't do something, tells us how they are going to write a 1 star review and have their friends do the same thing if we don't what they want.

It happens more than you think.

The whole purpose of Yelp is to try and use the reviews to make a buying decision. How can you do that effectively if you have to sift thru reviews that are nothing more than atom bombs because a person wants to "get" that business?





If someone reviews a business and just outright lies, Yelp should consider if that is a useful

I'm sure if a customer is upset and wants to review a business, the same things can be said while being professional and factual. Unfortunately, Yelp will refuse to either block the profanity or require the customer to write a factual review.

Personally, I'd like to see customers held to a standard and if they don't abide by certain rules or guidelines, either flag the account so people reading a review would know the customer is not following the Yelp guidelines, or hide the review until the reviewer adheres to the guidelines.

That's really not asking much of the reviewer.

If a customer continues to abuse the account, then they should be suspended from writing reviews and/or banned from the site.

I've had to deal with this type of thing twice, which is nothing compared to the thousands of reviews we've received, but they happen to reside in the first few reviews and they're calculated in the business rating.

The first time, a customer demanded to come behind the counter of a retail location to use the manager's computer. Of course, we said no. His Yelp review reads like this:

"These f\*\*\*\*\*g people are f\*\*\*\*\*g clueless! What a bunch of f\*\*\*\*\*g \*ssh\*\*\*s! What a f\*\*\*\*\*g joke of a business! These f\*\*\*\*\*g retards wouldn't let me f\*\*\*\*\*g let me use the m\*th\*rf\*\*\*\*\*g computer and I was f\*\*\*\*\*g late to the f\*\*\*\*\*g airport and they f\*\*\*\*\*g said no! What the f\*\*k is that? What's their f\*\*\*\*\*g problem? Don't they..."

Etc, etc, etc.

It should not be a surprise when I looked at this "customers' profile, he had 150 reviews written and, roughly, 149 of them were 1 star. The 1 star reviews I read were all laced with the same type of profanity as mine.

C'mon Yelp. How can you allow that to be placed on your site? It completely destroys the integrity of the review process. Let a customer write what he wants, just nix the profanity. Furthermore, What you're doing is giving a platform to unreasonable customers to hold a business hostage by threatening to write this type of review if they don't get what they want.

That's just unacceptable.

The second time was something similar, but no profanity. The problem I had with the second review was the customer completely lied. She used a picture of a product that was not purchased with us. She claimed we didn't refund her, but we did. She claimed we didn't help her, but we did. She claimed we were unresponsive, but we bent over backwards to make her happy. She didn't respond to our emails for information and she didn't return our vmails requesting information.

I realize you can't make everyone happy, but I offered to provide Yelp with copies of all of the docs, including purchase, refund and proof she cashed the refund check, to show that she just outright fabricated the review.

Yelp refused to get involved.

They suggested I respond to her review. I explained I didn't want to get into a public war of words with her on their site. They said that's all I could do.

Instead, I sent this particular customer a very polite PM and pointed out that we refunded her money and she had cashed the check. I asked if she would reconsider her review. I didn't ask her to change it, I asked her to reconsider what she had written now that the issue had been resolved.

Guess what she did?

She went on the site and edited her review to say that we tried to extort money from her and that we threatened to sue her.

But yet her 1 star review, out of hundreds for this location, is still near the top for everyone to


Is Yelp aware there are people/groups out there that will troll businesses with multiple reviews if someone is really upset with a business? Even if it is totally unwarranted?








Do a test run and check that the numbers add up. As long as your revenue from sales is higher than the advertising costs, you're in business. Keep upping the advertising budget and see the money roll in!
